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Welcome!



Greetings!

On behalf of the City of Springfield it is my honor and distinct pleasure to welcome you to our city. Springfield is situated in the heart of Ozark Mountain Country and is one of the fastest growing cities in the Midwest. It is a region blessed with much natural beauty, offering large lakes and beautiful streams with a wide variety of water recreation activities.

We are confident that your visit to Springfield will be rewarding. We urge you to take advantage of the many opportunities available, such as:

Birthplace of Route 66. Springfield is officially recognized as the birthplace of what became known as the iconic "Mother Road." It was on April 30, 1926 at Park Central Square where officials first proposed U.S. 66 as the name of the new Chicago-to-Los Angeles highway. Route 66 meandered across Springfield from Kearney to Glenstone to St. Louis Street, through Park Central Square to Olive and College Streets, then headed west along what is now Chestnut Expressway. The Birthplace of Route 66 Roadside Park is located near the intersection of College Street and Fort Avenue. Stop in at the Route 66 Springfield Visitor Center at 815 E. St. Louis Street to learn about other stops in town that will give you a glimpse of Route 66's heyday. If you happen to be in town in August, the annual Birthplace of Route 66 Festival, featuring a car and motorcycle show, parade, drive-in movie and concert, is a great event for any Route 66 enthusiast or lover of Americana.

Jordan Valley Park. features the Jordan Valley Ice Park, a multi-purpose facility featuring two NHL-size ice sheets and an adjacent 12-acre park with a fountain and water feature designed to evoke an Ozarks stream. In addition, the Springfield Cardinals, the Double A affiliate of the St. Louis Cardinals, play at nearby Hammons Field. A short walk on the new Jordan Creek Greenway or a drive on new Streetscapes links the Jordan Valley development to our traditional downtown area.

Downtown. Our downtown area features a variety of restaurants in all price and taste ranges, art galleries, the historic Landers Theatre, built in 1909 and renovated in its baroque Renaissance/Napoleon architecture and décor, and the renovated historic Gillioz Theater. Downtown and Jordan Valley also are close to several of the City's most popular venues, such as the hands-on Discovery Center, a children's science museum, the Walnut Street Historic District and the Juanita K. Hammons Hall for the Performing Arts at Missouri State University.

Other attractions. Springfield is home to many area attractions such as the Missouri Sports Hall of Fame, Wilson's Creek National Battlefield (Civil War), Dickerson Park Zoo, and nine public and private golf courses. You might also enjoy visiting our Mizumoto Japanese Stroll Garden, complete with a traditional tea hut. Springfield is the headquarters of Bass Pro Shops' Outdoor World, billed as the "World's Most Spectacular Sporting Goods Store," with its four-story waterfall, giant aquariums, nature center and taxidermy studio.



ABOUT SPRINGFIELD, MISSOURI

Springfield sits atop a plateau of the oldest mountain range in the country – the Ozark Mountains. Surrounded by rolling hills, the city offers the best in metropolitan and outdoor adventure, making it a perfect family destination. Springfield is rich with interesting and entertaining attractions, approximately 5,800 hotel rooms, more than 1,100 dining options and a variety of shopping and cultural activities.

Population: Springfield is the third-largest city in Missouri and the largest Springfield in the nation. The U.S. Census Bureau estimates the population within city limits is about 160,000. The estimated Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) is more than 440,000.

Weather: The average annual precipitation in Springfield is 43 inches including 20 inches of snow. The average low and high temperatures for each season are: Spring: 44-67° F; Summer: 65-88° F; Fall: 46-69° F; Winter: 24-45° F.

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
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The Queen City of the Ozarks stands out among the rest

As the third largest city in the state, Springfield is a vibrant and vigorous regional center of activity for commerce, recreation, live entertainment and the arts in southwest Missouri.

It's little wonder, then, that this city of nearly 160,000 people boasts the nickname "Queen City of the Ozarks," a characterization found as early as 1876, in a December issue of the *Springfield-Patriot Advertiser*.

"Springfield sits quietly, peacefully, and prosperously on the summit of the Ozarks, as a royal diadem on the brow of a queen."

In a book titled "*Seeing the Middle West*," written in 1923, author John T. Faris observed, "Springfield, standing in all of the splendor of a queen amidst its spacious orchards of stately fruit trees, has been fittingly designated the Queen City."

Today, this city on historic Route 66 lives up to the name with a wealth of varied points of interest and activities for the enjoyment of our visitors from near and far.

The city was established near a spring in what is now the downtown. That point of origin is marked by Founders Park, also not far from Jordan Creek, an area that has been redeveloped into Jordan Valley Park, with landscaped green space and a water feature. In addition, it is the site of Mediacom Ice Park, an indoor facility for skating year around and the home of Missouri State University hockey team play.

Just east of the park is Hammons Field, where the Springfield Cardinals baseball team plays its Texas League opponents. It is the place where you

can enjoy watching players who hope to one day be in the big league ranks.

The city's several colleges give it a youthful feel, and are also a source of sports entertainment, led by Missouri State University, Drury University and Evangel University. The JQH Arena on the Missouri State campus is not only the home of basketball action, but a place to see major music shows (Elton John, Carrie Underwood and The Eagles, among them) and other events, such as professional bull riding.

Not far away is the Juanita K Hammons Hall for the Performing Arts where you can see concerts, touring Broadway shows and other acts. (Bob Dylan, the late George Carlin and Bonne Raitt have been on the stage there.)

Prominent venues in the downtown area are the historic Shrine Mosque (Dylan and Willie Nelson have performed there), and the historic Gillioz Theater (John Prine, Lyle Lovett and John Hiatt have played there.)

Other performing arts in the downtown area are based in the Landers Theatre. The Springfield Regional Opera House, the Springfield Symphony Orchestra and Springfield Ballet, also grace the city's performing arts choices.

Speaking of downtown, it is the hub of nightlife with its many restaurants, music clubs and a movie theatre complex. You'll find the place abuzz on weekend nights, and many nights in between. And in the daytime you can find some unique retail shops and merchandise that might pique your interest.

East of the downtown is the Walnut Street Historic District, where one can see many historic homes that have been

renovated, and get a bite to eat.

Uptown is the Commercial Street Historic District, where the locals advise doing the "C-Street Stroll" to "catch the vibe of this eclectic artisan, entertainment and shopping destination."

The most visible attraction is the historic Jefferson Avenue Footbridge, the longest railroad pedestrian bridge in the nation. It was built in 1902 and remodeled a few years ago. The bridge is a signature of the importance of the Frisco Railroad (now Burlington Northern Santa Fe) operations in the city's history. Dozens of trains a day still pass underneath the footbridge.

Another historic point of interest is Wilson's Creek National Battlefield about 10 miles southwest of the city. It is the site of the first major Civil War conflict west of the Mississippi River, and it took place Aug. 10, 1861.

Springfield is also home to the Pythian Castle, which was opened as an orphanage in 1913 by the Knights of Pythias and later owned by the government for more than 50 years. It is located at 1451 East Pythian Street.

The Queen City of the Ozarks is also near Fantastic Caverns, a comfortable place to be in winter and summer and see the wondrous, water-formed stalactites and stalagmites of many hues and shapes. Fantastic Caverns, an ancient underground river, is the only ride-through cave in the country.

If you like museums, there are the Missouri Sports Hall of Fame and Springfield Art Museum.

Other points of interest are the Discovery Center, Dickerson Park Zoo, Bass Pro Shops Outdoor World and the Battlefield Mall shopping center. ■

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Birthplace of Route 66 Food Truck Park

What started out as a car lot selling work-trucks with a mechanic garage inside, is now Springfield's newest Food Truck Park on Route 66.

Located at 1530 E St Louis St, right on Route 66, the Food Truck Park has taken on the historical significance of the location. Before starting this new venture, the owner, Kirk, took the drive across Route 66 himself from Chicago to Santa Monica. One thing that Kirk came across on his drive were 11 statues originally called "Muffler Man Giants." Kirk found someone that knows how to recreate these statues and had him make one that was holding two spatulas and had a chef's hat on. Kirk named him "Carl" and he is the perfect symbol for the Food Truck Park, celebrating the past and welcoming the present.

There are currently nine food trucks on the lot and a diner-like seating area and full bar in what was the mechanic's garage. Food trucks include: **The Wheelhouse** – an original St Louis Street food truck – featuring items like nachos, burritos, quesadillas and vegan cauliflower; **London Calling** features pasties like their traditional "Oggie" filled with steak, onion, potatoes and rutabaga, others include "Tikka," "Bangers and Mash," "Bombay" and "Bacon Cheeseburger;" **Not'cho Ordinary Taco**, featuring different flavored tacos like "cordon bleu," "po boy" and "cheesesteak;" the **Olive Branch** has different Mediterranean options like choosing between a pita and bowl and adding protein and toppings; **Classic Rock** features they're excellent coffee but also has a great sandwich called "The War Pig," cinnamon rolls and protein shakes; **Davalon** has hibachi or teriyaki bowls, dogs, wings and bulgogi cheesesteak potstickers for an eclectic Asian menu; **Earth's Harvest** is a 100% plant-based food truck that features vegetarian options like "squash croquettes" and "roasted parmesan cauliflower." A new addition is **The Cow's Pajamas** – offering hand-crafted frozen desserts, including ice cream, sorbets, and ice-cream sandwiches, all served on a one-of-a-kind tricycle!

And don't forget the bar inside! They can make any drink you'd like and also have a menu of cocktails as well as beer and wine. It's the perfect place to spend an afternoon in the summer and immerse yourself in the history of Route 66.

Route 66 Food Truck Park is located at 1530 E St Louis St. For hours of each different food truck, check out their social media pages. Hours range from 11am to 8pm for the different trucks. ■



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Leong's Asian Diner, home of the original Springfield style cashew chicken

Springfield may not make it into the headlines often, but it is famous for one thing both nationally and globally: Cashew Chicken—Springfield style. At Leong's Asian Diner, on West Republic, the legacy continues as Springfield's original cashew chicken is served daily, and the tradition lives on.

Most Springfieldians embrace the Leong story as a Springfield classic, heralding it as one of those "American dream" tales we all love.

In 1940 David Leong, who recently celebrated his 99th birthday, emigrated from Guangdong, China. He served in World War II, and afterwards cooked his way through Philadelphia, New Orleans, Pensacola, and finally made one last move to Springfield, where, little did he know, he'd strike gold. Leong worked the kitchen at a couple of different supper clubs after arriving in Springfield. One of them, The Grove, was where Leong started serving Chinese-inspired dishes, and began to experiment with the dish that would become cashew chicken.

Deciding to open his own restaurant was the next step, and in 1963 Leong's Tea House was born. The 350-seat white tablecloth restaurant did exceedingly well, serving cashew chicken and Leong's famous egg rolls. With the success of the Tea House, other restaurants followed suit.

The Tea House was more than a 30-year success. It ensured that cashew chicken became a staple in Springfield cuisine. Cashew chicken is a mix of here and there, of two cultures. At its base is the American Midwestern and Southern affinity for fried chicken, but infused with Chinese flavors. The chicken is served on a bed of fried rice with Chinese oyster sauce and cashews.

Today there are more than 70 Chinese restaurants in Springfield, serving

cashew chicken. It's the norm; it's a staple; and one Leong is at it again.

From 1997 to 2010, Springfield went without a Leong-owned restaurant. Locals missed their original Chinese restaurateurs. In 2010, Leong's Asian Diner opened its doors, and since then, the restaurant has experienced great success!

The "diner" stars Leong's son, Chef Wing Yee, and features lunch, dinner, and take-out menus offering the regulars: cashew chicken, along with its variants; sweet and sour chicken, and general chicken. There are other Chinese dishes as well, but the menu also has other items to please the masses, including: Caesar salad, Angus beef and Swiss sandwiches, fries, mac and cheese, and even pizza for the kids. A full service bar is available, with a four-page wine and beer list, including seven different kinds of sake.



Artistic and modern yet cozy, Van Gogh's Eeterie is the newest brain-child of Joe and Claire Gidman, co-owners of the much-applauded Cafe Cusco. Gidman is tackling another of his favorite regions, this time one that's in Europe instead of South America.

"There were three exchange students from Rotterdam at my university and we became very good friends," said Gidman, "and then I actually went to their university in Holland and studied for a year."

Gidman explained that Rotterdam, a city of South Holland, is a very modern, contemporary and international, and is what the decor in Van Gogh's is reflective of. This contemporary style is airy, light, happy. And so is the food.

"One of the things that I loved about being in the Netherlands was of course the Dutch pancake. It's very, very different from an American pancake," said Gidman. "I really loved more of the savory options and they were kind of taken aback by these fluffy, sweet breakfast things that we have. In Holland, the pancake is something that you would eat for lunch or dinner."

Lucky for us, Van Gogh has an extensive Dutch pancake list, available all day. The savory menu includes options like "Sunflowers" made with scrambled eggs, sunflower pesto, bacon, skillet chips and cheese, and the "Rotterdam" made with shwarma beef, lettuce, cucumber, creamy garlic dill and curry ketchup. On the sweet side are options like the "Pirates of the Caribbean," made with brandy-fired raisins, banana, cinnamon and caramel.

Breakfast options include the "Brexhit," a traditional English breakfast, complete with all of the components: eggs, bacon, smoked sausage, skillet chips, fried



tomato, sauteed mushroom, baked beans and toast.

Lunch items include appetizers like "Dutch Fries - Pataje," which are crispy, gold potatoes served with pickled onions, frites sauce, curry ketchup and peanut sauce, "Edam Brandy and Cheese Dip Kaasdoop," which is Edam cheese melted with milk and brandy, served with bread and vegetables. There are also a selection of Dutch cheese boards, salads, soups and sandwiches.

Dinner entree options include delicious treats like "Kerrie Kip," made with chicken, peppers and pineapple in a lemon curry coconut sauce over rice and simple greens, and "Van Gogh's Ear," made with orechiette pasta, broccoli, smoked sausage, tossed in lemon garlic and anchovy sauce with aged cheese.

The drink menu includes the first kombucha bar in a restaurant in Springfield and is accompanied by optional natural syrups that can be added to make your kombucha really "pop." A selection of European wines are available, as well as beers are Dutch, Belgian or from White River Brewing Company which resides on Commercial street as well.

Upon entrance, the senses are assaulted kindly with the deep smell of sage, cardamom, cinnamon, and other scents, ever changing as you move up and down the aisles.

These fragrances create a kind of warmth throughout the store; perfectly welcome as we enter the winter months. A hot cup of tea procured from the selection only adds to the comfort as you browse through the store.

“We wanted people to be able to experience high quality ingredients and experiment with them, without being bound to a massive quantity,” Joe Gidman says.

Gidman and his mother Claire are the owners of the city-renowned Peruvian restaurant Café Cusco, and have recently opened a bulk tea and spice shop down the street, fondly named Chabom.

“Cha’ means tea, and ‘bom’ means good in Portuguese. The whole word ‘chabom’ also means tea tray in Japanese,” Gidman explains.

Aptly named, and completely true to its word, the shop has 86 different loose leaf teas, and hundreds of different cooking elements including spices, salts and sugars.

A great perk of coming in to choose from their teas is being able to taste before you buy.

“We wanted people to experience what they’re considering buying, so customers can bring a jar of loose leaf tea to the front and we’ll make them a hot or cold cup of it for two dollars. We have a variety of sweeteners and different kinds of cream, frothed to perfection, for you to choose from to add to your cup,” Gidman says.

He recalls sitting as a child in his grandmother’s kitchen as she cooked and cooked all day long for his large family, “she always had hot tea, always; usually chamomile. So I grew up drinking tea,” Gidman says.

Café Cusco has now moved to solely using Chabom’s spices, which gives us

hope that maybe, with careful selection from the store, we too could create such great food.

An employee is there to aid in selection and point you in the right direction for the dish you’re wanting to make.

An additional perk in the store is the “Spice Rack Refill.” You simply bring the jars from your spice rack that are empty, and the store will fill the jars for you with their stock. All you pay for is the weight of the spice in the jar; a low cost and tasty way to replenish your everyday kitchen stash.

Chabom also carries gift items like tea pots, tea accessories, gluten-free and vegan baked goods, boxed teas from England, China and Japan that aren’t commonly seen, as well as tea cookies and shortbreads.

On another note, the store also works with a local herbalist who’s created bath and body products that are “food grade,” which means you could actually eat the products.

Gidman swears by them, saying that with dry skin in the winter, the best way to combat it is to use natural products that encourage the skin to re-moisture itself.

Chabom also offers candles that are scented with essential oils and are soy based so that they create a burn that doesn’t offend anyone with allergies.

Chabom is the only store of its kind in Springfield, and is well worth the visit. Stop in for a cup of warmth this winter and see what delicious goodies you can cook up with the help of their vast spice collection, as well as pick up a few gifts on your way!




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



The 59th exhibition of *Watercolor USA* was juried by Misa Jeffereis, Assistant Curator at the Contemporary Art Museum St. Louis. Jeffereis was previously with the Walker Art Center, where she curated *Lee Kit: Hold your breath dance slowly*, and co-curated *Art at the Center: Guerrilla Girls*. Jeffereis noted, "I was particularly drawn to artists who were able to transform an ordinary scene into a world of wonder and imagination: a barn, train, streetscape, bouquet of flowers, flowing stream... I am honored to be witness to the talent and commitment of the watercolor painting community in this country."

Texas artist Laurin McCracken took home the top prize, the **Kenneth M. Shuck Memorial \$3,000 Award** for his high-realism entry, *Still Life With Silver*. McCracken is a watercolorist whose work is largely influenced by the Dutch and Flemish still life painters of the 16th and 17th centuries. He is a signature member of more than a dozen watercolor societies including the American Watercolor Society, National Watercolor Society, Transparent Watercolor Society of America, Southern Watercolor Society, Watercolor West, and Watercolor USA Honor Society. He is an Elected Member of the Allied Artists of America in their Watermedia Category. Other top awards include:

- **Greg G. Thielen Memorial \$2,000 Cash Award:** Steve Cavallo (North Carolina), *A Distant Memory*
- **Bill Armstrong Memorial \$1,500 Cash Award:** Alisa Shea (New York), *Cutting the Mustard*
- **Robert E. Goodier Memorial \$1,000 Cash Award For Traditional Transparent Watercolor:** Susan Sullivan (Missouri), *Glenn's Café*
- **Museum Purchase Award:** Trevor Doell (Missouri), *Crystal*

Of the 471 entries by 283 artists from 48 states and the District of Columbia, Jeffereis selected 81 works by 81 artists representing 30 states for inclusion in the exhibition. According to Museum Director Nick Nelson, "*Watercolor USA* is one of our Museum's most beloved and long-lived exhibitions. I find great comfort in things that provide consistency and certainty. Considering the current global pandemic, this year's *Watercolor USA* will be special to me for that reason. In its 59 years of existence, *Watercolor USA* has carried on alongside national triumphs and tragedies and this year will be no different. However, due to the global pandemic, we have had to modify our processes for this year's exhibition, and we plan to create additional virtual resources, including online viewing opportunities for those unable to visit the Museum in person."

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Go for a run while visiting Springfield

As the weather warms and summer arrives in the Ozarks, it is the perfect time to enjoy some of the many scenic and enjoyable running trails here in town. Springfield boasts over 100 miles of trail maintained and operated by Ozark Greenways, a non-profit organization dedicated to building community through connectivity since 1991. Whether you are a seasoned runner, new to the hobby, or just looking for a fun day of light exercise, Springfield and the surrounding area have you covered.

In the Downtown area, Jordan Creek offers an easy path through not one but three parks. Beginning at beautiful Jordan Valley Park, which features artwork that is a part of Sculpture Walk and daily fountains, the trail runs north to historic Silver Springs Park, home of the cultural landmark Timmons Hall, before ending at Smith Park in Midtown.

If you are looking for a longer run, check out Galloway Creek in southeast Springfield. This scenic route takes you through some of the most beautiful spots in town, running through Sequiota Park and past the popular Pet Cemetery, many sculptures, and the many charming restaurants and shops of Galloway Village. The trail, which was the first in Missouri

to be designated a National Recreation Trail by the National Park Service in 2003, also connects to the more rugged Nature Center trails and James River Water Trail, an ideal spot for canoeing, kayaking, and fishing.

Runners and bikers alike also enjoy the 35-mile Frisco Highline Trail, which connects Springfield and Bolivar. Built on the old Frisco railroad line, the wheels of locomotives have been replaced by bicycle wheels along this historic path. Kiosks tell the story of two bank robbers escaping along the railroad in 1908 six miles in, where you can also find delis, pizzerias, and cafes to relax. Continue on, and runners will enjoy more historic spots, gorgeous meadows, and unique bridges with stunning views. Frisco Highline is perfect for training for long runs or simple, relaxing strolls.

When using Greenways trails, remember to always practice trail etiquette and safety. Trails are open from sunrise to sunset, and dogs require leashes. Remember to always scoop the poop for canine companions as well. Remember to give other runners space, and announce yourself if you feel the need to pass. Land around the trails might not be public, so stay on the trail, and always hydrate, especially on a hot day. ■



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

Louisiana Purchase

The territory known as Missouri was included in the Louisiana Purchase of 1803. Soon after, the Delaware Native Americans received treaty land where Springfield's Sequoia Park and the antique stores of Galloway Village stand today. Missouri became a state in 1821.

Founding

In 1833, the legislature designated most of the southern portion of Missouri a single county. It was named for Revolutionary War General Nathanael Greene, largely through John Polk Campbell's campaign to honor a man he admired. Campbell was the founder of Springfield, announcing his claim in 1829. Springfield was incorporated in 1838.

Trail of Tears

In 1838, the Cherokee Native Americans were forcibly removed by the U.S. government from their homelands in Tennessee, Alabama, North Carolina and Georgia, then moved to the "Indian Territory." The move became known as the Trail of Tears due to the thousands of deaths on the journey.

The Trail of Tears traveled through the Springfield area via what is known today as the Old Wire Road. The Trail of Tears National Historic Trail auto tour route is along Interstate 44 westward to U.S. 160 (West Bypass in Springfield) and westward along U.S. 60.

Old Wire Road

The Old Wire Road, then known as the Military Road, served until the mid-1840s as a connection between Springfield and the garrison at Fort Smith, Arkansas. By 1858, the Butterfield Overland Stage began utilizing the road offering passage to California. Two years later, the region's first telegraph line was strung along the road and it was dubbed the Telegraph or Wire Road. The road proved vital during the Civil War. While portions of the road exist today, the most easily accessible is within Wilson's Creek National Battlefield.

The Battle of Wilson's Creek

On August 10, 1861, army units clashed near Wilson's Creek, the site of the first major battle west of the Mississippi River. The Battle of Wilson's Creek involved about 5,400 Union troops and 12,000 Confederates. The Confederates were victorious. Union troops fell back to Lebanon, then Rolla and regrouped. When they returned to Springfield, the Confederates had withdrawn. The battle led to increased military activity in Missouri and set the stage for the Battle of Pea Ridge in 1862.

The National Park Service designated Wilson's Creek National Battlefield in 1960. The 1,750-acre battlefield remains greatly unchanged and stands as one of the most historically pristine battle sites in the country.

Zagonyi's Charge

In an effort to run the Confederates out of the state, Maj. Gen. John C. Frémont headed toward Springfield in October 1861. Frémont became ill and turned his command over to Maj. Charles Zagonyi who led his troops into town, overcoming an ambush in the process and releasing Union prisoners in the first battle of Springfield. This engagement was the only Union victory in southwest Missouri. Zagonyi Park at Mount Vernon Street and Park Avenue includes a monument commemorating the battle.

The Battle of Springfield

For the two years following the Battle of Wilson's Creek, possession of the city seesawed. Then in January 1863, Confederate forces advanced toward the town square and battle ensued. As evening approached, the Confederates withdrew. The next morning, the Confederates left town. The city would stay under Union control until the end of the war. A series of markers throughout downtown Springfield highlight historic locations and details of the battle.

Springfield National Cemetery

Two years after the war ended, the Springfield National Cemetery was created. The dead of both the North and the South are interred there, though separated by a low stone wall.

"Wild Bill" Hickok Gunfight

In the wake of the Civil War, Springfield helped give birth to the Wild West era. In July 1865, the town square was the site of the nation's first recorded shootout. The incident between "Wild Bill" Hickok and David Tutt was also significant due to the incredible marksmanship exhibited by Hickok that made him known worldwide.

Arrival of the Railroad

On April 21, 1870, the St. Louis-San Francisco line rolled through Springfield, establishing a new city, North Springfield, with Commercial Street as its downtown. Commercial and industrial diversification came with the railroad and strengthened the City of Springfield when the two towns merged 17 years later in 1887. Today visitors can enjoy the view from the Jefferson Avenue Footbridge, peering below to the locomotive path still in use.

Birthplace of Route 66

Officially recognized as the birthplace of Route 66, it was in Springfield on April 30, 1926, that officials first proposed the name of the new Chicago to Los Angeles highway. In 1938, Route 66 became the first completely paved transcontinental highway in America – the "Mother Road" – stretching from the Great Lakes to the Pacific Coast.

Traces of the Mother Road are still visible in Springfield along Kearney Street, Glenstone Avenue, College and St. Louis streets and on Missouri 266 to Halltown.

When you're cruising the route, stop in at the Route 66 Tourist Information Center at 815 E. St. Louis St.

Bonnie & Clyde Kidnapping

In 1933, Springfield police officer Tom A. Persell was kidnapped by the infamous Bonnie Parker and Clyde Barrow and their gangster sidekick, W.D. Jones – and lived to tell the tale. Persell, on a motorcycle, pulled over a suspicious car and found himself facing a sawed-off shotgun. Bonnie and Clyde were on the lam and ordered Persell to get in the car and guide them out of town so they could dodge the cops. Six hours later, Persell was released unharmed near Joplin.

The Ozark Jubilee

The first national country music show on television was broadcast by ABC in Springfield from 1955 until 1960. The show is credited with popularizing country music and featured well-known performers, including Red Foley, Speedy Haworth, Brenda Lee, Porter Wagoner and Slim Wilson.

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
